YMCA Camp Minikani has been a home away from home to generations of campers since 1919. Lasting memories and friendships have been made around the campfire, on the creaky wooden floors of cabins, and in the cool Amy Belle Lake on hot summer days. The imprint Minikani leaves on one's heart is indelible, leaving an impression containing life-changing moments, friendships, and values that span a lifetime. The "Spirit" is ignited at camp and is steadfast, long after the summers of childhood have passed.

As we look to the next 100 years, we feel a responsibility to be good caretakers of the camp property and facilities. More than just buildings, a waterfront, or tree-lined paths, the physical environment of camp is where memories are created, friendships are formed, and campers discover who they are. 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Every summer, more than 2,700 kids and teens spend part of their summer at Camp Minikani where they explore the natural world, make new friends and challenge themselves to learn new skills. It is through these challenges that kids develop confidence, independence, and resilience – critical skills for a successful adulthood.

Camp provides an opportunity to unplug from devices and connect to others, away from outside pressures and their

every day routine. While the times have changed over the last 100 years, the need for kids to have a place where they can just be kids is more important than ever.

In addition to summer camp, nearly 9,000 participants experience the Spirit of Minikani in family camp, conferences and retreats and specialty camps like Adoption Family Camp and Camp Soul: bereavement camp for children.

More than 30000 in camperships are awarded each year to ensure all children can experience the Spirit of Minikani, regardless of their family's financial situation.

BREAKING BREAD NEW DINING HALL

The Dining Hall is the heartbeat of camp and where some of the most cherished traditions happen, from sharing community meals to the singing of grace and camp songs. Yet the current space is too small, too fragmented, and in need of updates.

A new, larger Dining Hall will seat all campers in one space, creating the community that is so integral to camp. Enhanced lake views and an architecture respectful to camp history, this new space for camp will uphold the traditions unique and special to Minikani.

A newly renovated kitchen, designed to be functional, efficient, and streamlined to provide the necessary accommodations for food preparation. Designated spaces to create meals from scratch, adhere to dietary restrictions of our campers, with the ability to cook and serve with ease is thoughtfully arranged.



MAKING A SPLASH NEW POOL TOLUGY &Ł

As much as time in the pool is about cooling off and having fun, it's also an important social time for campers. Being around the pool is as important as being in it, but the existing pool offers limited space.

A new swimming pool will provide recreational space for campers to gather, creating more opportunities for them to make lasting connections. The pool is a vital component to our summer operation. Campers take swim test in the pool and our youngest campers swim daily with their cabins.

New locker rooms will improve comfort and safety.





YEAR-ROUND OPPORTUNITIES NEW CABINS

Beyond the summer, Minikani provides Leadership Training and group retreat opportunities year round. But Wisconsin winters are long, creating the need for winterized cabins for those who stay with us during the off-season. We will replace our current Explorer Yurts with six cabins that will comfortably house guests all year, increasing our ability to serve more people. Like all cabins at Minikani, they will be built to create a sense of family and community.

FOSTERING CONNECTIONS DOWNTOWN CAMP

A series of outdoor spaces (Council Bluff, flag pole, tennis courts) – known as Downtown Camp – serve as the core of our wooded camp. Campers and counselors gather for programming, recreation and bonding. Current boundaries are poorly defined and the facilities are in need of repair.

A purposefully designed Downtown Camp will create new central commons area that will serve as a unique gathering and activity space. We will renovate the amphitheater (Council Bluff) to host the creative performances our counselors and campers are so well known for. As campers move through the property, there will be a strong linkage to the new dining hall and other camp paths.

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SPACE TO PLAY SPORTS & FIELDS UPDATES

The current playing field serves parking needs on big event days and during drop-off and pickup times for camp, leaving it torn up every few days during the busy summer season. A new, clearly zoned sports court will create a new activity center for campers, while providing flexible space for overflow parking. It will also create safer circulation from the Pioneer Unit to Downtown Camp.

COMFORT AND CONVENIENCE NEW BATHHOUSES (KYBOS)

Long days in the woods make for happy – but hot and dirty – campers. Our timeworn bathhouses are in need of replacement to ensure campers can find respite and comfort as they wash away the day and prepare for a new one ahead..





BUILDING CONFIDENCE & TRUST New High Ropes Course

Suspended high above the air, often beyond one's comfort zone, is where trust and confidence is built. A new High Ropes Course will provide the opportunity for campers (and year-round guests) to challenge and push themselves beyond their limits. They will learn to trust their own strength and in the team that supports them.



FIRST IMPRESSIONS GATEWAY/PARKING IMPROVEMENTS

There is great anticipation as families and guests arrive at camp. It is important to create a welcoming and safe first impression, especially for those who are new. Our current entrance is aesthetically underwhelming, but more critically, the driveway and parking has poor flow and poses safety concerns.

A new, tree-filled gateway will create a more inviting and intuitive entrance and driveway into camp. Improvements will create an easier and safer camp drop-off and pick-up, as well as increase parking capacity. As part of these improvements, we will relocate the maintenance shop to a more secluded area, away from campers and parents.
